from our Spiritual Advisor

Many Australians from when they are young are taught CPR. CPR (cardio pulmonary resuscitation) is a life-saving technique more commonly known as mouth to mouth resuscitation or the kiss of life. To assist someone who has stopped breathing the rescuer blows air into the lungs of the person who is in distress. If there is no heart beat, the heart is externally massaged by vigorously pressing on the chest.

We have not long ago celebrated the great feast of Pentecost, the birthday of the Church. What intrigues me is the way St John in his gospel describes Jesus giving the Holy Spirit to the disciples. Unlike St Luke who situates the outpouring at the Jewish feast of Pentecost 40 days after Passover, the Jesus of John's gospel breathes the Spirit on the disciples on the day of the Resurrection. In this scene there are no tongues of fire, no sound of mighty wind, no manifest reversal of the language difficulties of Babel. All Jesus does is breathe over his companions. A gentle action you see a parent do with a baby on a hot day when they gently blow on the face of their infant to bring them some relief from the heat.

Jesus breathes on us and we inhale what he exhales. Gently, with our intake of breath, we take his Spirit deep within ourselves. With breath in our lungs we continue to live. With breath in our lungs we can speak, sing, whistle a tune. With breath taken from the lungs of our Lord, all these ordinary things can become something extraordinary. Our words can give encouragement and hope, challenge and comfort. Our songs and tunes can bring joy to the hearts and minds of those who feel there is nothing to sing or make music about.

What happens to us? We are resuscitated. We were close to dying but because another saw our distress and acted death was cheated of a victim. He wished us peace then breathed on us. While there is breath in our lungs may we give his life-giving spirit to others.
