In my renewed study of the **Charism** I have been reading about the persons closely involved in the early days of the Movement. **Manuel Aparici** – the Leader of Spanish Catholic Action preparing for the pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela set down for August 1948; **Bishop Juan Hervas** – his early contact with Bonnin, his love for the Cursillos and his naming of them as "Cursillos in Christianity"; **Fr Sebastian Gaya** – who wrote the 'Pilgrim's Guide' and was appointed Spiritual Advisor of Young Catholic Action; then of **Fr Juan Capo** who succeeded him; **Guillermo Estarellas** who was inspired to introduce "De Colores"; and **so many others** in those early years– you can read of them yourself as you continue your personal study of the Charism.

It was with such people as these that Eduardo Bonnin shared his daily life, and `revealed, instilled, inculcated, detailed and lit the light of the Charism that has spread throughout the world...... because the Holy Spirit willed it.'

This brings me to the topic of **Friendship**.

One Dictionary calls it 'the state of being friends' or a' liking between friends;' Another broadens it to "affection between people, pure and unselfish, born out of mutual esteem." The reality is that life itself tells us what friendship is all about. And this, as we in the Cursillo have been shown, is best understood and valued within the person.

What has struck me powerfully this Lent is that Jesus was killed by people who had attitudes and thoughts I can see in myself. Some of these I can list easily. I don't like disturbance to the status quo. I don't like someone being more popular than I am. I don't like my authority being challenged. I don't like having to change my way of thinking and acting.

Those who tortured Jesus before killing him hoped, as all torturers do, that he would admit he was wrong. Even if he didn't, his followers would be so frightened about what might happen to them they would abandon him and his teaching.
