**Pan-African Congress** – In his report Francis Napoli of Gibraltar wrote of the great challenge, to evangelise, to which the lay faithful are called. He reminds us, of our responsibility as disciples of Christ , that there is no time to sit back and hold onto what we have been given through our own Cursillo experience. We must go out and multiply our efforts in all our environments, especially in the challenge of the vast continent of Africa.

We offer Francis, and those who attended on our behalf, Fr Maximilian Bergmayr (GECC); Teresa Diwald; Rob Kpotor (Togo) our sincere thanks for their hard work and dedication during the Congress. They met with Cardinals and Bishops, lay members of Episcopal Conferences in Africa, all in the name of Cursillo. They have laid the foundation stone for outreach into Africa. From our Spiritual Advisor

Greetings to all. This is my first contribution to the newsletter since August 3 when I underwent heart bypass surgery. Recovering from this entailed three months leave, which was needed to allow surgery wounds to heal and grow stronger. I have been very grateful to all around the world who have prayed for my recovery over this time.

We Cursillistas treasure friendship as the way to bring the good news of God's love in Jesus to everyone in our worlds. When you find yourself in hospital for whatever reason you do value those who take the time to visit or write. In the early stages of recovery you especially value those who do not stay too long as you tire quickly.

I thought about this it struck me that the way we show our care for someone requires us to take their circumstances and needs into consideration more than what we might get from the action. It would be like someone visiting not for the well-being of the patient, but so that they, the visitor, could later brag to others about what they did. You could almost hear the conversation: "I went to the hospital and stayed for an hour and a half. Do you know that the visit wasn't appreciated as X fell asleep while I was there!"

Being a friend always means thinking of what is best for the one we are befriending. This is how Christ was with all the people he met. He tailored his responses to the real situation of each person. Sometimes a compassionate and healing gesture, sometimes a word of advice and challenge, sometimes a display of anger.

May we spend time judging each situation, praying about it and then acting in the way best adapted to the person we are with.
