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From our Spiritual Advisor

The great saints often speak very knowingly of their own sinfulness. As we read their stories or think about the holy people who are part of our lives and we see this same sin awareness within them, we ask what is that are talking about. They do so much good. They are clearly close to God. With the canonised saints, the Church has proclaimed them to possess heroic virtue! Where does sin come into this.

A good explanation goes like this. When you look at a window at night it looks fine. You can see out easily. There is nothing there to worry about. Look at the same window with the sunlight shining through it. Now you can see the smudges and dirt clearly. Something the same happens to us as we come closer to the light that shines from God. With this light shining through us, we see clearly the smudges and dirt that prevent the light shining through even more brightly. The saints were people like that. The light of God shines through them brilliantly, and they are aware of that because they can see the goodness that it brings to all the people they come in contact with. At the same time as seeing the fruits of this goodness, they see the smudges clearly and want them gone so that more of the light can shine through.

This is what God's grace does for us. We are the windows through whom God's goodness shines on our world, in all our environments. And we have influence in many environments. As we prepare for the celebration for the birth of Our Lord, the light that shines in the darkness, let us be aware of what can prevent the light shining out for all to see and rejoice in. We know the things we must do to achieve this goal so we commit ourselves to making the changes. With this commitment made, we can then give ourselves to the Lord as the birthday gift He so longs to receive from us.
