My dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As our term of office draws close to an end I need to emphasise that which is most important for us to remember in our journey of the Fourth Day:

The love that God has, cannot be measured, contained, explained, understood, compared or seen. For it is quite simply, the most pure and authentic love you will ever know and - this is the Good News, God in Christ loves us, that we must spread as we live out our fourth day, and especially in our Group Reunions and Ultreyas where we share our Piety, Study and Action.

What to think about coming to Holy Communion

The heading of this reflection can be read two ways: what is "coming to Holy Communion" all about or when I come to Holy Communion "what am I thinking about."

One aspect of what the ritual is all about is communion with the holy. We can be in communion with nature on a visit to the bush or the beach. We can be in communion with friends and family over a meal. We can be in deep communion with the holy, with God, when we do what Jesus left his friends to do in memory of him. We are in communion with him present and alive.

Hand in hand with these thoughts about Holy Communion is what we think about as we come to receive Holy Communion. The most obvious answer is Jesus. But related to him come other thoughts. We are delighted to receive him, but this ritual of the Eucharist confronts us starkly with his betrayal and abandonment by those closest to him. We come face to face with his death as his body yields up his soul and his blood stains the ground at the foot of the cross. Remembering all this as we come to receive, strangely, is a source of strength in dealing with betrayal and let down and death in our own lives, in the death of loved ones through age, illness, accidents or violence.

Our immersion in this all too familiar ritual stirs us to leave aside the swamp-call of self-pity - poor me, why me - in the face of adversity. It stirs us to see the time, treasure and talent the Father has entrusted to me as a steward to be used to bring real Christ-given comfort and strength to those who need it.

With resurrected eyes we look at a so hungering world and know we can do something to feed and nourish.

World hunger is not caused or perpetuated by God but by us and those like us who have let compassion die.

May we do all we can to respond to our Lord, creatively and encourage our children to do likewise. The World Encounter is only five months away. May we continue to pray that there we encounter not just each other from all corners of the earth but the Risen Lord who gives us one faith, one baptism and one Lord.
