### From Our Spiritual Advisor

#### A CROP TO BE HARVESTED BUT WHO BENEFITS?

Jesus words in the gospel for the fourteenth Sunday of Ordinary time took me back to a time when I was parish priest in a citrus growing area of the Archdiocese. The fruit would ripen on the trees and then the pickers would go to work. Many were needed and so for a time the town saw many strange faces in the streets. Some of the itinerant workers were students from overseas. Others were men and women who moved from one part of the country to another as different crops reached harvest time.

What were important were the benefits that would flow from the harvested crop. The fruit would be packed for export and sent to the markets for sale. The growers would have income from the sale to support their families and orchards and pay the workers who picked the fruit. The final benefit was the enjoyment the consumer derived from eating a juicy orange, grapefruit or mandarin.

What did Jesus see that was ripe for the harvesting? As he said: the harvest is plentiful but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to do the work.

We have a clue in the Genesis story of the beautiful garden God created as the home for his creatures especially our first parents, Adam and Eve. Here, God would stroll in the garden enjoying the company of those made in the divine image and likeness.

Even when Adam and Eve's wilful rejection of God affected their ability to see reality: they became frightened of the God who created them and loved them, and hid from sight. They became ashamed of their own appearance. But even though they lost the ability to see the goodness they were immersed in, the goodness was still there. The world God created was still rich with seed bearing plants, oceans with fish, and fields with animals. The sun and moon still shone. The world was always good and still is.

This goodness is the crop to be harvested. It is there for the benefit of all so that we can eat and grow strong and enjoy the company of others with whom we feast. One of the blind men Jesus cured in the course of his ministry said, in reply to Jesus asking him what he wanted: "Lord, that I may see again. "Again" is the operative word. Once this man had sight; he could see and had lost it. All of us in our world are just like that. Once we could see but then lost the ability. With the touch of Jesus' hand that sight will return.

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We are the workers to harvest the crop. All that we do is directed to assisting others to receive new sight from Christ. To see the superabundance all around. To be grateful for that divine largesse and enjoy all that flows from making use of it for God's glory and the benefit of others.
